

Internet job vacancy report

March 2025 | Economic brief

The Commonwealth Jobs and Skills Australia (JSA) Vacancy Report is based on a count of newly lodged online job advertisements in March 2025 on Seek, CareerOne, and Workforce Australia. Unless stated otherwise, all data are reported in trend terms.

Northern Territory (trend)

Jobs advertised in the Territory declined by 1.0% in March 2025. The largest declines were in the categories of 'labourers' (down by 2.0%) and 'community and personal services' (down by 1.7%), while the largest increases were in the categories of 'sales' (up by 0.6%) and 'technicians and trades' (up by 0.1%) (Chart 1).

The Territory reported the third ranked result of the jurisdictions, which ranged from a decrease of 4.3% in Tasmania to no change in South Australia. Nationally, the number of new jobs advertised decreased by 2.1%.

Jobs advertised in the Territory declined by 8.8% over the year to March 2025. The largest declines were in the categories of 'managers' (down by 19.0%) and 'community and personal services' (down by 16.3%), while the largest increase was in 'sales' (up by 6.5%).

The Territory reported the second smallest decline of the jurisdictions, which ranged from a decline of 29.1% in Tasmania to a decline of 7.1% in South Australia. Nationally, the number of vacancies declined by 16.3% (Chart 2).

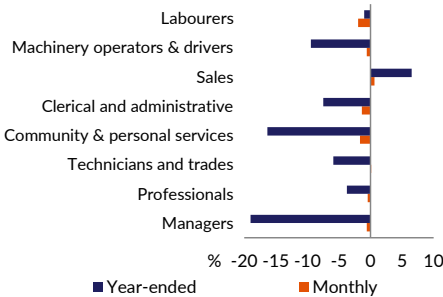
Regional vacancies (original)

JSA reports regional jobs advertised data in original terms, and as a three month moving average, though seasonal variations remain.

Over the year to March 2025, jobs advertised in the Darwin region declined by 5.0% (Chart 3), with 'managers' (down by 24.6%) and 'community and personal service workers' (down by 13.0%) reporting the largest declines.

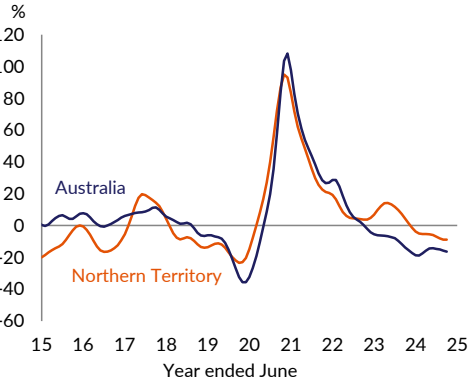
Over the year to March 2025, jobs advertised across regional Northern Territory declined by 10.0%, with 'machinery operators and drivers' (down by 22.5%) and 'community and personal service workers' (down by 17.9%) reporting the largest declines.

Chart 1: Internet job vacancies by industry (change, trend)



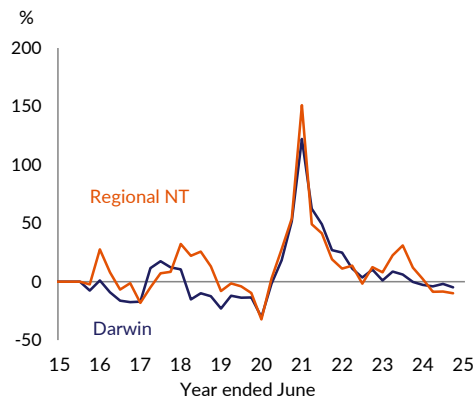

Term	Definition
Monthly change	Compares the latest month with the previous month
Year-ended change	Compares the latest month with the same month last year
Trend	A trend series is a seasonally adjusted series that has been further adjusted to remove irregular effects and 'smooth' out the series to show the overall 'trend' of the data over time.

The Department of Treasury and Finance has updated the terminology used in the economic brief publications when referencing growth. The table below outlines the changes to terminology. This is a terminology update only and does not impact the definition or growth calculation.
