Social Indicators May 2020 Northern Territory Crime Statistics, February quarter 2020

The following is a summary of information on offence counts in the Northern Territory in the February quarter 2020 compared to the February quarter 2019, unless otherwise stated.

- Recorded offences against property increased by 462, or 8.0 per cent, to 6215. This increase was driven by increases in house break-ins (164), property damage (361) and theft (89) offences (Table 1).
- Commercial break-ins decreased by 134, or 17.4 per cent, to 635, with the largest decreases in Katherine (-53) and Darwin (-52), partially offset by increases in Alice Springs (25) and Palmerston (8).
- House break-ins increased in all regions with a total increase of 164, or 22.9 per cent, to 880, with the largest increases in Darwin (85) and Alice Springs (32) (Table 2).
- The number of offences against persons increased by 215 or 11.4 per cent to 2107, primarily driven by an increase in acts intended to cause injury (180) (Table 1).
- The number of acts intended to cause injury increased by 180, or 11.0 per cent, to 1821. This was primarily driven by increases in Alice Springs (93) and Darwin (47), partially offset by a decrease in Palmerston (-29).
- Of the total number of acts intended to cause injury, 1814 were assaults, where 61.5 per cent involved domestic violence, 47.0 per cent involved alcohol and 32.4 per cent involved both domestic violence and alcohol.
- For the year ending February 2020 total offence against the person rates were at the lowest level over the reported six year period with 3136.9 offences per 100 000 people (Figure 1).
- Over this six year period, total offences against the person peaked in 2018 with 3 507.8 offences per 100 000 people (Figure 1).
- On average, acts intended to cause injury have made up 86 per cent of total offences against the person, and has been the main driver of change in offence rates for offences against the person, over the six years to February 2020.
- The Northern Territory crime statistics are prepared by the Department of Attorney-General and Justice using data recorded by the Northern Territory Police.


